Partor's Ponderings

On July 20, 1969 astronaut Neil Armstrong descended the ladder of the Apollo 11 lunar lander and set foot on the surface of the moon. On August 16, 1969 Joyce Sudmeyer and Henry DeGraaff were married at the Presbyterian Church of Roseland in Chicago and left a week later to serve as Volunteers in Mission for the Presbyterian Church schools in Las Minas de Baruta, Venezuela.

Those events provided an amazing change of perspective for my developing world view. The year before, on Christmas Eve 1968, the sight of the first Earthrise ever witnessed by a human being came to astronauts Frank Borman, Jim Lovell and Bill Anders, the crew of Apollo 8, were orbiting the moon. They had already gone around the moon three times. On the fourth pass, they looked up and saw something they hadn't expected to see because they were preoccupied with examining the cratered lunar surface below. What they saw surprised them. It took their breath away.

What they saw was the Earth rising. Days before, they'd sat on the launch pad atop that Saturn V rocket, risking their lives so they could take a good look at the moon. What turned out to be really significant about the lunar voyage was that they saw the earth from a new perspective."

As a young man with a degree in Aerospace engineering and Fluid Mechanics class time with Irving Michelson who worked with the team that did the equations for the fuel systems for Saturn V and described the incredibly narrow margins for error – particularly in the first few seconds – I was amazed.

Some years later, after being ordained to ministry, I applied to NASA be part of the space shuttle program. I thought that there should be a chaplain on the shuttles. They disagreed but invited me to apply on the basis of my technical background. Joyce also disagreed on the basis that we had two young children. A couple months ago, Joyce and I went to see the movie First Man. A line spoken by Ryan Gosling as Neil Armstrong before going to the moon was "I don't know what space exploration will uncover, but I don't think it'll be exploration just for the sake of exploration. I think it'll be more the fact that it allows us to see things. That maybe we should have seen a long time ago. But just haven't been able to until now."

When Joyce and I arrived in Venezuela as volunteers in mission, we began a year of seeing the world in a whole new way – a way similar to the way Paul turns a mirror on his own life and ministry in his letter to the Colossians. He emphasizes that his role in relationship to Christ is "servant." As this "servant," Paul gladly took up his special commission — that is, as a missionary. We were truly blessed to be able to experience as Paul did, the joy of sharing the greatest "mystery" ever known. This "mystery" is not some secret system of aeons and emanations. This mystery is the miraculous gift of "Christ in you, the hope of glory," seeing the earth from the astronaut's perspective of a great distance and from our new perspective of working closely with the people of Las Minas.

Fifty years later we still celebrate the joy that those new perspectives gave to our life together.


