Partor's Ponderings

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Not only has the COVID 19 virus stopped us from gathering in person to worship, it has stopped the progress we were making in moving toward becoming a more beautifully diverse congregation. Each time that I have come to the office, I have stopped to look at the bulletin board and reflected on who we are and the congregation that we may be developing.

During my time as transitional pastor, we have focused on senior ministry and fallen short. Then we spent more than a year negotiating a shared pastor relationship only to have the potential partner congregation withdraw at the last minute.

Then, we were blessed with new members. Our new members brought us to the point where we may declare ourselves to be a multicultural congregation. We invited the president of the New International Seminary to visit with students from Africa. I began thinking that we may be able to focus on developing exciting new possibilities in cooperation with the seminary.

Then, the virus came, and we had to shelter in place.

I think of the early church. It was an all too brief period of amazing inclusion of diverse people forming faith communities in this fledgling Christian movement. Its growing prominence led to the co-opting of this fast-growing movement by the Roman Empire, when Constantine found it politically advantageous to become a Christian. This was the beginning of the domestication of the followers of Jesus. The early became the church of the elite, and cultural and class differences took a toll on congregational diversity.

I still feel that we may be able to revive the model of the early church and keep open to all. I will never forget the response that Margaret Jameson had when I first arrived and asked about the congregation's outreach to the community. She said, "we believe that it is our job to welcome and love anyone that God sends through our doors."

God has sent people. We have welcomed and loved our newest members.

I believe that we must be racially and culturally diverse in order to be faithful. Racial and ethnic diversity in the United States has introduced dramatic tensions within faith communities. Decades ago, Life Magazine identified 11 AM on Sunday to be the most segregated hour in America. It is now made so painfully clear that the 21st century must be the century of multiracial, multicultural congregations.

I believe we are among the ones who can do our part to make it happen. We can dismantle the prejudices and unconscious biases that segregate houses of worship and become communities of hope and reconciliation. We come to this task with our own stories, having traveled on our own respective journeys of risking and learning, dealing with challenges and celebrating victories. Along the way, this congregation has lived a roller coaster of highs and lows and faced the joys and complexities of ministry.

Wednesday night at 9 PM Joyce and I participated in the 9- and one-half minute demonstration of shining our flashlights heavenward. I remembered the Sunday when I put links to "This Little Light of Mine" into our worship service.

My prayer is that First Presbyterian Church of Corona may come out of the current crises and be a light that continues to shine even more brightly and faithfully.

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Dear members and friends of the First Presbyterian Church of Corona:


After watching the news and reading articles on the internet for the last two days, I fear that many religious leaders just don't get it. Your Session gets it and has determined that we shall not gather at the church building until it is safe. This virus can move quickly to affect personal and communal health. Thus, I feel compelled to send you this letter.

Some Christian leaders are mounting aggressive campaigns and even filing lawsuits against state government officials claiming that a ban on religious gatherings is a violation of the free exercise clause in the First Amendment and trying to promote the idea that we are being persecuted and victimized as Christian people.

Our Constitutional rights are very important to me, and the Constitution is centrally important to all citizens. Peter Marty, editor of the Christian Century magazine reminded me that the Constitution doesn't require me to give food to the hungry or shelter for the homeless. There is no amendment that forces me to listen to science, or consider the needs of the medically vulnerable, or attend to the aspirations of the elderly. I appreciate my rights. But fixating on those rights at the expense of the love, compassion, and mercy contained in the substance of faith is wrong. Faith is more essential than a lot of things right now, perhaps especially these lawsuits that claim moral high ground for religious freedom.

We have chosen to follow Jesus' commandment to care for our neighbor, especially our most vulnerable neighbors (Matthew 22: 37-40), during the coronavirus/COVID19 pandemic. While we are not gathering at the church building, we have chosen to see this as a time for us to try new ways to worship, learn, pray, and stay connected ...after all, *God is always doing new things (Isaiah 43:1-19)!*

There have been some days this month that I thought we were living in the old west. Land grabbing has been an issue as of late. The green area in front of our house is just one place that people are trying to take by behind-the-back payments and intimidation. They even put a tin fence around most of the green area and around the tree our kids had been playing in. The man doing this also has been bringing groups around to intimidate the community. They are not armed- just lots of young men. So, our community has been uniting to fight this in a just and legal way. We hired lawyers and also have got a court order that no construction can take place until the issue is finalized. Testimony




